Opening remarks

Patrick de Cambourg



Patrick de Cambourg is President of the French accounting standards setting authority (*ANC/ Autorité des normes comptables*. Appointment by the French President in March 2015). As such he is also a Board member of the European body with advisory capacity to the European Commission on IFRS (EFRAG / European Financial Reporting Advisory Group) and a member of the IASB forum of major standards setters (ASAF / Accounting Standards Advisory Forum). In addition, he is a Board member of the French capital markets regulatory and supervisory authority (*AMF / Autorité des marchés financiers*), of the French banking and insurance supervisory authority (*ACPR / Autorité de contrôle prudentiel et de résolution*) and of the French financial stability board (*HCSF / Haut Conseil de Stabilité Financière*).

At the special request of the French government, he recently prepared two reports on the future of the accounting profession (June 2018) and on propositions to develop further non-financial information ("Ensuring the relevance and reliability of non-financial information: an ambition and a competitive advantage for a sustainable Europe". May 2019.). He is currently Chair of the Project Task Force (Corporate reporting Lab@EFRAG) created to respond to the request received from the European Commission on preparatory work for the elaboration of possible European Union non-financial reporting standards.

Patrick de Cambourg, a Political Sciences graduate (*Sciences Po Paris*), holds also degrees in public law and business law and a Bachelor of Arts. As chartered accountant and auditor, he spent his professional career within the Mazars Group, successively as junior, manager and partner. He became President of Mazars in 1983. In 1995, he was appointed as Chairman of the Management Board of the newly created international partnership and became in 2012 Chairman of the Supervisory Board. Since late 2014, he has been Honorary President of the Mazars Group.

Hubert Tondeur



Hubert Tondeur holds the CNAM Chair in Accounting and Governance. He is a chartered accountant and associate auditor, he is involved in professional bodies and was a member of the ANC Board.

In his activities, he writes and co-writes numerous books and articles on accounting issues, in particular IFRS. He has worked for 10 years in the petrochemical sector for the implementation of IFRS standards and contributes to the development of accounting training. He works internationally, in particular for the World Bank and the International Delegation for Auditing and Accounting (DIPAC), on issues relating to changes and the implementation of accounting standards. He has worked in Algeria, Laos, Madagascar and many countries in West and Central Africa.

Hubert Tondeur holds also a PhD in management sciences and the French Agregation of Universities.

Christopher Hossfeld



Christopher Hossfeld is Associate Professor in the Financial Reporting and Audit department at ESCP Europe, Paris, and currently the department coordinator. He acquired teaching, academic and practical experiences in different countries such as France, Germany, the UK, the US or Vietnam.

His fields of expertise are financial and international accounting as well as bank accounting and regulation. He teaches those subjects in the different programs of the school: Master in Managment, Specialised Master, MBA and Executive Education. His research focuses especially on aspects of international accounting and manifests in numerous publications in specialized journals. He is also author or co-author of several books covering the above mentioned subjects.

Currently, Prof. Hossfeld is working in the field of the application of IFRS in Europe (impairment testing) and its impact on international comparability of financial statements.

Prof. Hossfeld is also member of several scientific associations, such as the European Accounting Association or SUERF.

Françoise Flores



Françoise Flores Françoise Flores joined the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB) in 2017. She has almost four decades of experience in company financial reporting and in standard-setting.

She served as chief executive officer of the European Financial Reporting Advisory Group (EFRAG) and as chairman of EFRAG's technical expert group (TEG) from 2010 to 2016. Prior to joining the Board, she briefly returned to work as a partner at accountancy firm Mazars in Paris, France, where she had also worked from 2002 to 2010.

Ms Flores has served as chief financial officer for more than a decade for both listed and private groups, including BPI Group, Intertechnique subsidiary IN-LHC and Thomson Group subsidiary Auxilec SA.

She has an MBA from Hautes Études Commerciales, Paris, France.

Benoit de Juvigny



Benoît de Juvigny, a graduate of HEC and IEP in Paris and a former student at ENA, was appointed Inspector of Finances at the French Ministry of Economy and Finance in 1984.

After different posts at the French Ministry of Economy and Finance, he joined *Crédit Lyonnais* where he held various posts specialising in corporate banking and corporate finance in Paris and Brussels. He joined Hervet Bank where he was a member of the Executive Committee. He was responsible for developing the strategic plan for the CCF-HSBC group. He became CEO of Dewaay Bank – dedicated to asset management- in Brussels.

In 2004, he joined the AMF as the Head of Investment Service Providers and Products, then as Managing Director of Corporate Finance and, as of 2011, as head of both Corporate Finance and Corporate Accounting and Auditing.

Benoît de Juvigny was appointed on December 1st, 2012 Secretary General of the AMF, *Autorité des Marchés Financiers*. He is also Chair of Esma Corporate Finance Standing Committee since September 2017.

Bertrand Perrin



Bertrand Perrin was appointed to the IFRS Interpretations Committee in May 2016 for a three-year term with effect from 1 July 2016. Bertrand Perrin is Director, Accounting Standards & Special Projects at the Group Consolidation & Financial Reporting Department of Vivendi, a European integrated media and content group headquartered in France.

In his role, he principally addresses integration of new businesses acquired, accounting for divestments, and implementation of new IFRS accounting standards, such as currently IFRS 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers. He was heavily involved with IASB and EFRAG throughout the development phase of IFRS 15, notably on Media, Software/video games, and Telecommunications activities. He also coordinates some aspects of Vivendi's quarterly financial reporting, such as employee benefits, impairment testing, and financial instruments.

Bertrand Perrin has joined Vivendi in 2003 to lead the IFRS conversion project of the group. He previously worked as an External Auditor for 9 years. He studied business administration at Audencia Business School in Nantes.

Yasunobu Kawanishi



Yasunobu Kawanishi is the Vice Chair of the Accounting Standards Board of Japan (ASBJ) and is also the Chair of the International Forum of Accounting Standard Setters (IFASS).

He started his career as an auditor at a firm that is currently part of KPMG AZSA LLC in Tokyo.

Prior to becoming the Vice Chair of the ASBJ, he has worked as staff of the U.S. Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) and the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB) as well as the ASBJ.

Anne Jeny



Anne Jeny is Professor in the Accounting Department at the ESSEC Business School and former head of the department. Jean-Michel Etienne



Jean-Michel Etienne holds a Master's degree in economics and advanced accounting qualifications. Jean-Michel Etienne began his career as an auditor with Price Waterhouse (1975-1980). He joined the Financial Department of Renault Group where he occupied several functions. From 1988 to 1990, he was Accounting Director at Valeo before becoming planning and internal control Director for the Pinault Group. In 1991, he was appointed Group Vice-President and Group Financial Controller at CarnaudMetalbox, before being made Chief Financial Officer of Crown Cork Europe after CarnaudMetalbox was taken over by Crown Cork. Chiara Del Prete has been appointed EFRAG TEG Chairwoman from 1 April 2019.



Pascal Barneto



Pascal Barneto is full professor of finance at university of Bordeaux. Pascal started his career as a financial analyst and has carried out numerous expertise and training with listed groups. His current research focuses on firm financing strategies, the carbon market and the integration of IFRS into financial statements. He holds a PhD in Finance and the French Agregation of Universities in Management Sciences.

Philippe Carbonnel



Philippe Carbonnel, a graduate of HEC Paris, joined Safran (originally with Snecma) in 1993. First as a commercial analyst, then in charge of the financial engineering of contracts for civil aircraft engines. Later on he is appointed Vice-President finance and contracts of the joint-venture with Pratt & Whitney and negotiates its legal, tax and financial set-up. He comes back to the holding company of the Group as adviser to the chief financial officer, which included the setting up of the centralized cash and FX management for the Group and the implementation of the employee shareholding scheme. He is then responsible of the financing of the holding company of the Group and various financial engineering operations, especially in connection with M&A transactions or international cooperation. He is currently the head of corporate financing for the whole Safran group. He is also a board member of the *Fondation Safran pour la Musique*.

Linda Mezon is the Accounting Standards Board (AcSB) Chair and has served in this capacity since July 1, 2013. Combined with her previous board experience as a volunteer member, she has 12 years of experience as a standard setter, including the period encompassing the adoption of IFRSs and development of separate sections of the CPA Canada Handbook – Accounting for private enterprises and not-for-profit entities.

Linda provides leadership to the AcSB to achieve its mission, as well as enables and promotes a deeper stakeholder understanding of the Board's strategic plan and activities. She is a frequent speaker on topics related to financial reporting, able to represent both the standard setter and preparer points of view.

Prior to her appointment as Chair, Linda was the Chief Accountant at the Royal Bank of Canada (RBC), responsible for the interpretation and application of IFRSs and U.S. GAAP. She also monitored compliance with Canadian regulatory requirements on financial disclosure and was responsible for auditor independence. Delphine Gibassier



Delphine Gibassier is a full professor in accounting for sustainable development at Audencia, and a recognized expert in non-financial accounting and reporting with 18 years' experience in both practice and academia. She is also the director of the Research Centre "Multi-capital Global Performance", and the academic director of the executive MBA Chief Value Officer.

Eric Duvaud



Eric Duvaud, partner at EY, is the founder and head of the EY Climate Change and Sustainability team in France and Western Europe (200 consultants). He has been developing these services for 25 years, first with Arthur Andersen and since 2002 with Ernst & Young (EY). He leads the reporting and extra-financial verification solution for EY on a global scale, as well as major consulting assignments related to decarbonation and long-term sustainable value creation for global companies, bringing together in-depth multi-sector knowledge and experience. He has also certified the extra-financial performance of many global companies over the last 10 years and is currently a member of the European Task Force on Extra-Financial Reporting within EFRAG.

Sébastien Godinot



Sebastien Godinot has worked in the environmental sector for over 20 years and is currently the economist of WWF European Policy Office and Head of the Sustainable finance unit. His area of expertise lies in public and private finance, budgetary and subsidy issues, and the wider issue of sustainable economy.

Denis Beau



Denis Beau - been Deputy Governor of the *Banque de France* since 1 August 2017. He has also been appointed by the Governor to represent him as Chairman of the *Autorité de contrôle prudential et de résolution* (French Prudential Supervision and Resolution Authority – ACPR). He is a member of the college of the *Autorité des marchés financiers* (French Financial Markets Authority – AMF) and of the Supervisory Board for the European Central Bank's Single Supervisory Mechanism.

Denis Beau has also been appointed Chair of the Committee on Controlling (COMCO) of the ECB since 9 January 2018 and Chair of the Analytical Group on Vulnerabilities (AGV) of the Financial Stability Board (FSB) since March 2019.

Born in 1962, he joined *Banque de France* in 1986 after graduating from l'Institut d'Etudes Politiques de Paris. He subsequently received a Master degree in Business Administration from INSEAD. His career path at the *Banque de France* led him to hold management positions in the Financial Markets, Payments and Market Infrastructures and Economics and International Relations departments. He was seconded to the New York Fed (1997-1998) and served at the Bank for International Settlements as secretary of the G10 Committee on Payment and Settlement Systems (2007-2008). He was then appointed Director General of Financial Stability and Operations and a member of the Executive Committee of Banque de France. In this capacity he was a member of European and international committees dealing with monetary policy and financial stability issues and prudential regulation of banks (Euro Retail Payments Board, Committee on the Global Financial System, Basel Committee on Banking Supervision – co-chair of the Macroprudential Supervision Committee).

Alain Deckers has over 20 years of experience in public service at the European Commission. He has been responsible for policy reviews and policy development in areas including trade in goods, environmental policy, public procurement and financial services regulation.
